

Graduate Admissions Portfolio Guide

The portfolio gives the admissions committee a sense of each applicant's aesthetic sensibility and intellectual curiosity. Through the works themselves and in the inquiry or argument framed by their presentation, applicants should use the portfolio to exhibit their potential to develop original design proposals. Documentation of CAD drafting skills or technical coursework is not appropriate unless it demonstrates design thinking.

Preference is given to individual work. If group work is included, individual roles and contributions are to be noted.

All text, drawings, photographs, or other images presented in the portfolio are to be authored by the applicant. If other sources are used for any reason, they must be properly attributed.

Applicants with architecture backgrounds

Portfolios should contain individual design work, preferably studio work completed in an academic setting. Samples of professional work, such as construction drawings or renderings, are not to be included unless the applicant had a significant role in the design process. In such a case, the applicant's role must be clearly explained.

Applicants with non-architecture backgrounds

Portfolios may contain any visual, design, or creative works, such as paintings, collages, graphic design, woodworking, freehand drawings, sketches, photographs, sculpture, jewelry making, and so on.

The admissions committee prefers to see original creative work that represents the applicant's visual, spatial, conceptual and/or design abilities; applicants without formal architecture training are not expected to include any architecture-related work.

If concerned about having content to include, consider participating in an architecture workshop or summer program (like our TryArch and YArch programs), enrolling in an art or design class, or exploring options at a local arts center.
